





The "Sophia Home" Hospital

Vallhallavägen, Stockholm.

The Sophia Home at Stockholm, which is situated in a beautiful park, is one of the most prominent institutions in Sweden for the training of sick-nurses.

The founder of the hospital was Her Majesty, the present Queen-Dowager Sophia, and it was opened in 1884, during the life-time of the late King.

The training of the sick-nurses at the Sophia Home takes three years, and comprises: a theoretical course in anatomy, physiology, hygiene, medicine and surgery, given by doctors; instruction in sick-nursing, in preparing food for the

sick, and in gymnastics, given by the teaching nurse of the home.

Every year the chaplain of the home conducts Bible classes for pupils

and nurses.

At the end of the course, half the time being spent as pupil and half as probationer, some of the nurses may enter the Sisterhood of the Sophia Home.

Since the Home was opened, 577 pupils have been taught there, though all have not completed the course.

The sisterhood of the Sophia Home has 104 members. They live at the institution, receive a salary and their uniform, and are sent out to work all over the country. At present there are 67 sisters living in Stockholm, and 37 in the provinces. They make a contract with the Home, but they may break it at any provinces. They make a contract with the Home, but they may break it at any time, after 3 months' notice. The Sophia Home has its own pension-fund, with a capital of £ 29,000. The sisters also have a 'Home for the Aged' of their own, situated close to the Hospital itself, and where those who are ill and overworked may rest for a time.

The chief field of work of the sisters is the hospital, a view of which may be seen above. The Sophia Home has 68 beds and 3 operating theatres. Any doctor may send his patient to the Home an 1 perform operations there without paying any fee; the patients may call in any doctor they please. In 1910, 73 docs

tors had patients at the hospital.

The institution comprises the buildings before mentioned; a chapel, where the patients, even if lying in bed or on sofas, can attend to the divine service in a gallery specially built for the purpose; a home for the nurses and pupils which is connected with the hospital by a gallery; the chaplain's house and the kitchen-department.

The park in which the buildings of the institution are situated is of such an extent, that the Home can be enlarged as soon as the resources of the hospital

will permit.

The institution is directed by a Board, the president of which is H. M. the Queen Dowager. The head of the Home is Miss Maria Planck, who lives at the

was founded in the year 1897 by Mrs. Thyra Grafs ström. The fancyswork division aims at producing the finest possible specimens of work with the aid of the foremost artistic capacities: it makes cushions, curatains, table cloths, carpets, stuffs for furniture, etc., and gives advice for furnishing homes. Some large works, too, have been done there, such as church embroideries, flags, haute-lisses, etc.; among these we may mention the tapestry composed by the artist Boberg for the Stockholm Exhibition 1900 and now to be seen in the National Museum.

In the year 1904 there was opened a school for fancywork, directed by clever teachers. The number of pupils amounts to 50—75 every year.

The permanent exhibition at Regeringsgatan, where partially and entirely finished works, hand-made lace and material, etc., are exhibited, is open every week-day between 9 a. m. and 6 p. m.

Once a year there is arranged a special exhibition of the latest specimens of work.

"Svenska Hem" (Swedish Homes).

The Women's Co-operative Society,

is an organization of women of all classes of society, who, by means of energetic work on co-operative lines, endeavour to obtain the economical advantages which usually result from such businesses. The Society works entirely on Rochdale principles; cash-payments are obligatory, and the net-profits are divided among the members in proportion to the amount of their purchases from the Society.

As yet, the enterprise embraces only groceries, provisions, vegetables, fruit, etc.

»Svenska Hem» opened its first store on Nov. 8th., 1904, with about 400 members, and the joint-capital amounted to L. 1,100. Five years later, on Dec 1st., 1910, the Society had 4 establishments, 1,832 members, and a joint-capital of L. 2,800. The total sales last year amounted to L. 21,900, as against L. 10,170 during the first year. Since the start of the enterprise, L. 1,800 has been paid to members and shop-assistants, in dividends and bonuses.

All the members and officials, as well as the clerks and shopassistants, are women.

The Society has a special information-bureau for co-operation, by means of which it endeavours to promote participation in the movement on the part of the women of Sweden, and of Stockholm especially.

The Charity Organization Society in Stockholm has existed since 1889. The main object of the Society is to improve the living conditions of the poor. By promoting organised cosoperation between charitable agencies and persons, and between these and the municipal PoorsLaw; by making investigations in order to find out how to help people in distress without pauperising them; by repressing mendicity, but seeking to find the right sources for help, if really needed; by itself undertaking, when necessary, the administration of relief; by all these and other means the Society is trying to further its object.

The Society also has a working department for women (»Slöjds afdelningen») at 2 A. Arsenalsgatan, and a Children's Countryshome

at Sätravik.

The Fredrika-Bremer-Association

was founded in 1884 (by the Baroness S. Adlersparre, née Leijonhufvud) to promote the advancement of woman and to rally all those willing to co-operate in the work. In order to intimate in what spirit the work was to be carried on, the Association took the name of *Fredrika Bremer*, the pioneer af woman's rights in Sweden.

The Association works for: the improvement of the position of women, married and single; the spreading of information concerning educational institutions and courses of study open to women; the investigation and the collecting of statistics regarding women's work; the opening of new fields of work and the improvement of the rate of wages for women.

The Association grants scholarships to enable women to study and to enter into professions or trades; it has a sick relief fund for womenteachers, clerks etc.; it procures situations in various branches for educated women; it conducts an agricultural and household school for teachers for training the peasant women in rural economy etc. etc.


Branches of the Association are at work in different parts of Sweden.







FREDRIKA BREMER.

1801-1865.

THE MEDAL, coined by the Swedish Academy in honour of her centenary, justly shows this proud inscription: Laudes antiqui orbis et novi assecuta.

In fact, Fredrika Bremer was the first of Swedish authors who attained a world-wide renown, and though the splendour of her popularity may have faded some-what with time, nevertheless there remains for her an imperishable glory, founded on a deepening appreciation of her character and work. As a pathfinder in literature, she belongs to her age; as the apostle of the enfranchisement of woman, she will extend her activity to all future ages, every fresh generation of Swedish

women venerating in this high and ardent genius their patron saint.

She did not express herself in any single brilliant manisfestation, nor in an orderly arrangement of ideas. Her nature was too rich and sympathetic, incapable of that resolute exclusiveness which makes the artist and the hero, as well as the systems builder. Youthfully eager and elastic to the last, she sought enlightenment in all realms of life and thought, with a moral, rather than intellectual,

passion of curiosity.

Beyond doubt she was a born poet, a mystic and a visionary, but above all, she was the most assiduous of inquirers, the most indefatigable of wanderers. Late in life, she travelled over considerable parts of the world (America, Palestine, Switzerland and Greece), like an adventurous scientific explorer; but it was in the social relations of men she made her important discoveries. She wanted to get an inside view of things, were it a negro hut or the government of the United States, in order to gather materials, not for fiction, but for the one grand purpose of her existence, that of helping to humanise mankind. Ever firmer grew her grasp on that portion of the task which, by special vocation, was hers, and toward the end of her life she was permitted to see eminently practical results, in measures of legislation and education, brought about by her truths ful "Pictures of domestic life".



SOPHIE ADLERSPARRE

née LEIJONHUFVUD, PSEUD. "ESSELDE".

(1822 - 1895)

SOPHIE ADLERSPARRE is to be regarded as the first figure in the Swedish Woman's Movement. Her name is intimately connected with the formation of nearly all our earlier women's organisations, such as The Swedish Red Cross Association (1864), The Friends of Art Needles Work, The Frederikas Bremers Association (1884) and its magazine, "Dagny", which, in 1885, sucs ceeded the first woman's "Magazine for Home Reading", which she began to publish, in collaboration with Mrs. ROSALIE OLIVECRONA in 1859.

Courage, purity, and capacity for work were preesminently the qualities which gave Esselde a unique authority within the leading groups of women in Stocksholm. To these may be added the statesmanlike quality of being able to find the right person for the right work. She had a discoverer's eye for the new and original within the woman's world. Among others, Selma Lagerslöf, as she herself has told us, may be reckoned among the "discoveries" of Esselde.



ANN MARGRET HOLMGREN

née TERSMEDEN.

Ann Margret Tersmeden was born in the year 1850. In her early youth she married Frithiof Holms gren, professor at the university of Uppsala. Als though her duties as wife and mother of eight children, took the greater part of her time and strength, she had a warm interest in the events of the day, and a frank and open liberalism was one of her chief characterisstics. She took a leading part in the peace movement, and was second president of the Swedish Women's Peace League.

When, in the year 1902, the first society for Woman Suffrage was formed, ANN MARGRET HOLMGREN,

who was then a widow living in Stockholm, gave all her time and strength to the work and was elected a member of the organisation committee. She was confronted by the necessity of awakening women all over the country to the importance of winning their politis cal rights. Since she had never been on a public platform, it was her first duty to educate herself as a speaker. And during six years, up to 1908 when she had to give up her beloved work owing to illshealth, she was agitating all over Sweden. She was the first woman to speak about woman suffrage in seventy= five towns and she may now with pride refer to her= self as the organizer of more than fifty local branches of the N. W. S. A. Her task was a very difficult one. In many places the ignorance of the meaning of woman's cause was great, and in many places there were no organizations for men even.

But Mrs Holmgren happily possesses in a high degree the personal charm which wins friends, and the gifts of persuasion which win converts. A glowing faith and a living enthusiasm characterize all her efforts, and her cheerful hopefulness is known to all Swedish suffragists. This little delicate woman has been a burning light through the hard days of the Swedish suffrage movement. With her to lead the way the work has been quite easy for those who had to follow. Few of the workers of to day would be able to realise the difficulties which she had to conquer. None could have conquered them better then she did.

Mrs HOLMGREN has been elected a life member of the Central Board of the N. W. S. A.



ANNA WHITLOCK.

ANNA WHITLOCK, born June 13th 1852, is the pioneer of many important social and political entersprises of modern Sweden.

Her chief work in life has been education, and as an educator she has been one of the first to carry out the idea of coseducation. Her famous school, »Whitlockska samskolan» in Stockholm, has, indeed, instroduced many educational reforms that have since been adopted by other schools all over the country.

Furthermore Anna Whitlock was the first to spread the cosoperative idea among the women of Sweden and started the now flourishing enterprise: Women's Cosoperative Society »Swedish Homes» (Svens

ska Hem) in Stockholm. She also has taken the inistiative in arranging vacations colonies for poor schools children. In order to spread the knowledge of social and political questions among women, she has started and arranged courses in different branches of sociology and social and political history.

As the organizer and leader of the suffrage movement in Sweden she has, more than any other person, left her impress on that movement. She was one of the founds ers of the first Woman Suffrage Society in Stockholm 1902, and when, about a year from that date, so many societies had been formed, that the necessity of a central organization became imminent, she was elected president of the Swedish N. W. S. A. Her uncoms monly clear judgment made her understand that the chief condition for the existence of such a society as the N. W. S. A. was to keep it politically neutral, and up to this day the political neutrality has been strictly maintained. The Swedish suffrage organization owes its unity and strength in a great degree to ANNA WHIT: LOCK's power of organization, and though, on account of illshealth, she was obliged to leave the presidenzy in 1902, she still gives the benefit of her interest and experience to the N. W. S. A., of whose Central Board she was elected a life member.

If Miss Whitlock's chief characteristics were to be given in one short sentence, the Latin words printed on the Swedish bank notes would be the most suitable: "Hinc robur et securitas".



ELLEN KEY

Ellen Key was born on the Sundholm estate, Dec. 11th 1849. In her home, where the parents had many political and literary interests, Ellen Key was roused to reflexion on the serious questions of life. She became interested at an early age in the Woman's question, and when — about 1870 — she listened to the debates from the gallery of the Second Chamber, she thought that she knew many a woman who could have made better speeches on social and political questions than many of the members of Parliament of those days. Ellen Key was probably the first woman in Sweden who made a political propaganda speech on Woman's Suffrage. This was at the beginning of 1890. But some years before (1888), she had lectured twice on "The married woman's right to property and her

legal independence" and spoken for the wife's economical and legal position being placed on an equal footing with that of the husband. In a lecture on »Woman and the peace movement» she has emphasized the importance of women's efforts in the cause of peace. Against some of the exaggerations of the Woman's Movement of that time, she wrote "Missbrukad kvinnokraft» (The misused force of women) and "Naturliga arbetsområden för kvinna» (Natural spheres of work for women) 1896, and she emphasized that it was just as mother and educator in the home that woman was able to further the cause of human progress. In »Kvinnorörelsen» (The Woman's movement) 1909 she has described the motives and tasks of the Woman's Movement and has summed up her position in regard to feminism. has expounded her opinions on education in her great work »Barnets århundrade» (The Child's Century). Ellen Key's greatest and most important works are »Tankebilder» (Thought=Pictures) 1898, and »Lifslinjer» (Lines of Life), 1903-1906, in which she gives her theories of life. They can be characterised as evolus tionary idealism. She believes in man's power of elevating himself by the power of his own will. Cul= ture is the product of human liberty. Development moves onwards towards a richer feeling of community of interests. Individualism does not exclude social soli= darity, it fulfils it. Ellen Keys romantic and estheticallys inspired individualism has, in the course of its development, deepened more and more into a theory of individualistic duty which, just in the interest of a higher intensity of life, places the highest ethical and cultural ideas as a standard for the individual. As a philosopher dealing with problems of life and culture, Ellen Key certainly stands in the foremost rank.



SELMA LAGERLÖF

WHILE the wonderful art of Selma Lagerlöf impresses deeply the minds of thousands of readers all over the world, they are under the spell of a hitherto unknown power — the power of Swedish nature and the mystical side of the Swedish character. The art of Selma Lagerlöf is eminently and typically national. It was the folk tales of her own province that first possessed her mind and fantasy, and it is those reminiscences from her childhood which give such a special and powerful charm to the tale of Gösta Berling. Deep into the soul of the people reaches her fairyspsychology, and in visions of great artistic beauty she has penetrated in to its

most characteristic qualities. These are some of the reasons why we admire Selma Lagerlöf perhaps more than any other of our living authors.

Among her most famous works may be mentioned: "En herrgårdssägen" (A Story of a Country House), "Jerusalem" and "Nils Holgersons underbara resa" (The wonderful journey of Nils Holgerson), which is read in all primary schools of Sweden. In the year 1909 the Nobelsprize was granted to her by the Swedish Academy.

The Swedish Poor-Law Reform Association

(SVENSKA FATTIGVÅRDSFÖRBUNDET)

which was constituted at the first national Congress on Poor-Law and Charity, 1906, has for its chief object to »unite those interested in Poor Law and Charity matters into a body working for the up-to-date development of Relief-work.» The Association, at present embracing about 500 Boards of Guardians, 70 Societies and 1100 private members, affords through its office gratis information and advice on all questions relating to Public Relief and Charitable work, makes investigations as to wrongs reported, arranges lectures on Poor-Law questions all over the country, trains Poor-Law officials and charity workers by an annual (6 months) course; has founded an archive and a library of printed and written matter relating to charity-work at home and abroad etc. The Association has a special section for children's-aid work (Barnavårdsbyrån, adr. 51 Kornhamnstorg, Stockholm.) And for Rescue work amongst Discharged Prisoners, Vagrants etc. (Skyddsvärnet, adr. 32 Gamla Kungholmsbrogatan, Stockholm.)

The Young Women's Christian Association.

This Society is one of the oldest women's associations in Sweden, and was founded more than 25 years ago. Its object is to work for the physical, intellectual, moral and spiritual welfare of young women by gathering, in the houses of the leads ers and in the rooms of the Society, young women, for Bible classes, and Mission evenings, at homes and discussions. Special meetings are arranged for different groups of workers, such as shop-assistants, sick-nurses, young women employed in the States or private transport services, or in industrial occupations etc. Courses of instruction are also arranged in practical subjects such as sewieng and cooking, Swedish and foreign languages, etc. The Association has some boarding houses; one for young women students, and another for working girls, as well as some restings

homes in different parts of the country. Alternate conferences and summer/courses are held every year. Most of the societies have circulating libraries.

The Y. W. C. A. in Sweden has about 50 branches and about 5000 members, and is affiliated to the Universal Association of the Y. W. C. A., which consists of 7000 societies roith 590,000 members. In Stockholm the chief branch has its own building at 3. Brunnsgatan, with rooms of various sizes, classrooms, a gymnasium, library and readingsroom, etc. The Society pus blishes 3 papers.

The Northern Anti- Vivisection Society,

well known all over the world, has been founded on the initiative of women and has based its activity mostly on woman's aid, both intellectually and materially. The society was founded Oct. 7th 1882 at the Palace of Stockholm by Princess Eugenie, who, together with the sisters, Johanna and Victorine Hägg, laid the economical foundations of the society. The woman who, in the North, has worked in this branch with unique success is Mrs. Elna Tenow, who, by her sensational lectures about 1890, succeeded in attracting the attention of all the North to the dangers of vivisection and who has ever since been at the head of the struggle. The periodicals "Fylgia" and "The Rights of animals" are wellknown, as well as some pamphlets, such as "The victims of science", "Scientific barbarism" etc. In England the Swedish women, Lizzie Lind of Hageby and Leisa Schartau, who have been secretaries of the Society, have succeeded in making the struggle against vivisection as much upstosdate and as intense as the political campaign of the day, which does not mean little.

Among the founders of the society and its faithful supporters may also be mentioned Adèle Rudenschöld, Ladysinswaiting to the Queen, and Mrs. Julie Blomquist, now deceased.
